UMW to Collect Items for At-Risk Youth

The Atlanta Roswell (AROS) District's Social Action project for 2016 is a focus on human trafficking. One of the ways that we will be participating in this effort is to create hygiene kits for at-risk youth. Packaged in a gallon zip lock bag, the kit should include:

- Washcloth
- Regular Size Toothpaste
- Toothbrush in Original Container
- Lip Balm
- Deodorant
- One Pair Socks



The kits will be turned in at the district gathering on November 12. They will be given to Covenant House for distribution to at-risk youth, and are not an UMCOR item. Monetary gifts will be accepted too.

Gifts to Children of Women Prisoners at Lee Arrendale

"Our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our service" came to mind December 11 when we arrived at Lee Arrendale prison and began wrapping the Christmas gifts we had purchased for the 50+ children of women incarcerated there. As United Methodist Women, we are called to serve the Lord, to be His hands and His feet, and love His lambs. We truly felt that we were keeping our vows to Chamblee First that morning.



Becky Veal had spent hours going over the shopping list the chaplain had sent us, and had found many items on Amazon. On October 31, Leslie Mottern took the rest of the list and hit Wal-Mart, twice! How joyous it was to be Christmas shopping for these children while everyone else in Wal-Mart was worried about Halloween costumes and candy.

Royeese came over on a nasty, wet afternoon while we loaded the sorted, labelled gifts into her Ford for delivery to the prison. The gifts had to be inspected by security before wrapping and distribution so this was part 1. Part 2 involved meeting at the church in the dark on the morning of December 11 and driving north to our wrapping event. We were required to leave everything but our photo IDs and wrapping paper (thank you Alma North!) in the car and go through a scanner to enter the area where we worked. We did not have our phones or cameras to get pictures although the chaplain did take some with hers. It was a great day of fellowship and many blessings shared.

Bake Sale Benefits Abused Children and Victims of Trafficking

We had a good turnout for our annual UMW Bake Sale in November. We are so thankful to have so many in the church who are willing to share their resources and talents cooking and buying these goodies for the benefit of such good causes.

Our proceeds of \$3,473 was divided equally between Marla's House and Tapestri. Marla's House of Hope in Belize provides safe, loving, nurturing care for God's Children who have been removed from an abusive environment. Tapestri is an organization in Atlanta that provides direct services for survivors of human trafficking, domestic violence and sexual assault.

We were able to use to the profits to support several causes, including Restore II; gifts, bags, wrapping paper and tags for the children of prisoners at Lee Arrendale Prison; Malachi's Storehouse; Murphy Harpst and UMCOR. We plan to continue this fund raiser in 2016.
